# Flashcard Fun

Note for Parents: You can use the flashcards in the traditional way for vocabulary practice or try one of the fun suggestions below!



Pictionary: Put the cards in a pile. Take turns taking one card from the pile and drawing what is on the card. The other player guesses using words in your new language.



Charades: Put the cards in a pile. Take turns taking one card from the pile and acting out what is on the card. The other player guesses using words in your new language.



Memory: Print the cards on one side of paper, cut them out, and lay them face down. Children can match the image with the vocabulary word. For children who aren't reading yet, print two sets and use only the image cards. Have them call out the vocabulary word when they get a match.



Silly stories: Deal cards out to children and have them make up a story using the cards. Adding English is okay too! Children can add on to each other's stories.



Silly sentences: Separate the cards into nouns and adjectives. Have children pick one card from each pile and try to make a silly sentence using the words and as much of their new vocabulary as they can.
